The following is a list of current PTC new rail projects: Columbia Ave., Broad to 24th St.; Rt. 3; 54th St. Hill from Jefferson into 54th; Rt. 70; Jefferson & Frankford new stainless steel coaches on order. Ave. to 2nd, Rt. 5. This job removed the Howard St. cutback for Rt. 5 as the switch at Howard and Jefferson was removed. Another recent loss was the trackage on Germantown Ave, between Oxford & Diamond when Rt. 50 was rerouted via 6th St.

Stations on the new Subway-Surface tube beyond 36th and Ludlow will be located at 36th and Valnut, and 37th and Spruce. Among the PCCs being repainted are the original low 2000's. All present rolling stock is scheduled for shopping.
