BAD NEWS FOR STEAM FANS

In the Interstate Commerce Commission history. We hope it was pleasant. building in Washington recently, a "memorial to the steam locomotive" was recently dedicated. The memorial consists of a marble and limestone shaft topped by a bell from a former Frisco engine. Members of Congress from coalmining areas protested, but in vain.

Hard on the heels of this news, we learn that the nation's No. 1 steam stronghold, Norfelk & Western, has ordered eight road-switchers -- four from Alco and four from EMD -- with a view to dieselizing operations between Lynchburg, Va. and Durham, N. C. The road, in its announcement, stated that there are no plans for using diesels on the main line -- yet. A mixed train now operates on the branch.

PTC DOINGS

Bus conversions on PTC are now coming fast and furious. Routes 7 and 70 went bus on May 29, Route 54 on June 5, and Routes 57 and 63 are to go June 19. The latter is of particular interest, since it was the first route in town operated by electricity. At the same time Route 54 went, Richmond car barn was closed, and Route 60 now operates out of Allegheny. Also, Route 34 was transferred from Callowhill to Woodland, shortening its deadhead run.

The company plans to move its general offices from their present downtown location to a new building to be erected at 2nd and Wyoming. There are also rumers that plans are afoot to install fare boxes in all vehicles.

NEWS OF THE PENNSY

Pennsylvania Railroad is conducting a survey on possible extension - or possible ending -- of electrification. President Symes admitted that the entire fleet of Pennsy MU cars needs replacement, and this was undeniably a factor in stimulating the survey. General Electric and Westinghouse are assisting.

PRR has installed color-light signals at several points on the main line west, and a public address system in Suburban Station.

NEWS ELSEWHERE

Illinois Terminal has gotten rid of all passenger operations north and east of Springfield, Ill.

Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee's Shore Line will be abandoned in July.
