PTC's fare increase came through suddenly on April 21, and 15-cent tickets are no longer in use. However, tickets already sold at that time were accepted through the week.

PST at the same time secured a fare increase to 18 cents, 2 tokens for 35 cents.

Local commuter railreads applied for a 10% increase in commutation fores but this was turned down by PUC pending further study.

PRR has inaugurated Family Fares to New York on Saturdays. They go into effect May 14.

As this is written, PTC nonoperating clerks are on strike following a layoff, but interference with service has been minor.

The Crusader's midday trip to Jersey City has been discontinued. The stainless steel equipment, like the Wall Street equipment, now makes only one round trip.

New Haven has decked out its new electric locomotives, and also its timetable cover, in a startling red, white, and black color scheme.

NYC's Third Avenue Elevated quits — for real this time, they say — on Thursday, May 12.

Pennsy has installed ticket machines at 30th Street, Suburban, and North Philadelphia stations, but the Pennsylvania Station in New York is still without them.
